National Move Over Law Resolution Passes in U.S. Senate

The resolution supports the goals and ideals of Move Over Laws and urges relevant federal and state agencies, as well as nongovernmental organizations involved in traffic incident management response, to promote the existence of and adherence to state Move Over laws.



As with past House and Senate versions, TRAA is proud of our part in assisting with several of the cosponsors and generating support for the resolution. The passage of these resolutions increases public awareness of Move Over laws and the need for drivers to slow down and move over when they see any incident responder on the side of the road.

Note, "simple resolutions" are entirely within the prerogative of one chamber or the other. They can be reintroduced annually and do not require the approval of the other chamber or signature by the president.

Starting in January of 2026, funding will be available to support small businesses (like MSSA members) during an employee's absence. Leave Administrators will be able to apply for this funding once an employee is approved for leave. Oualifications include:

- 30 or fewer employees
- Average employee wage of under 150% of statewide average annual wage (\$104,286 in 2023)

Benefits:

Funding up to \$3,000 to:

- Hire temporary workers
- Increase an existing workers' wages to substitute for an employee

Cones, Flares, Triangles: Are You Protected?

It's time for tow operators and company owners to rethink roadside safety. A recent lawsuit resulted in a massive settlement after a motorist crashed into a parked tow truck. The case highlights a harsh reality: Tow companies can be held liable for failing to provide adequate emergency warnings.

If you think Slow Down, Move Over laws are enough, think again. Legal precedents are shifting, and vicarious liability is a growing threat. Are your safety protocols enough to protect your business, your operators—and your life?

A Higher Standard for Tow Operators

Tow operators are held to higher safety standards, especially on highways. Some claim that setting up cones, flares, or triangles takes too much time. But when motorists crash into parked tow trucks—resulting in fatalities—does that argument hold up in court?

With 733 U.S. tow operators killed and another 90-plus internationally, very few investigations confirm the use of warning devices. If most tow trucks carry them, why aren't they being used?

Legal Liability: Are You Defensible?

When roadside crashes result in lawsuits, the key legal question becomes: Should towers be held responsible, knowing that parking on the shoulder is dangerous?

If a vehicle collides with a parked tow truck, plaintiffs will argue:

"How could my client have known a tow truck was working?"

Without law enforcement present, towers must defend their actions. Attorneys frequently ask:

- -- Are you trained in highway incident response?
- -- Have you completed a National TIM (Traffic Incident Management) course?
- -- Can you provide a valid training certificate?
- -- Were your tow truck's emergency lights activated at impact?
- -- When was your last safety meeting?
- -- Did you deploy cones, flares, or triangles?
- -- Did you request law enforcement assistance?

If you can't provide satisfactory answers, you're at risk of major legal exposure.

Investigations and Their Findings

When towers are struck and killed, investigations often conclude:

"The only warning device used was the tow truck's flashing light bar."

Regulatory agencies like FACE, OSHA, and NIOSH repeatedly issue post-incident safety recommendations:

- ✓ Complete TIM Responder Training, regardless of company size.
- ✓ Use wireless controls for tow truck beds and winches.
- ✓ Deploy warning devices when working outside the truck.
- ✓ Limit time on the traffic side of the vehicle.
- ✓ Use cones, flares, and bi-directional triangles to alert motorists.
- Carry warning devices in front of your body for visibility.
- ✓ Never turn your back to traffic while setting up.
- ✓ Allow motorists enough reaction time by placing devices at proper distances.

Even attorneys stress that towers should wear high-visibility gear and use warning devices to establish a clear hazard zone.

Industry-Wide Accountability

Fatality investigations often note:

"The tow truck's warning lights were on, but no hazard signs were placed on the roadway."

Some operators say, "I'm only there for three to five minutes." But if you acknowledge the dangers, doesn't that reinforce the need for better protection?

When asked in court,

"Did you take steps to identify your active work zone?"

There are only two answers:

- 1-Something showing due diligence and safety awareness.
- 2-Nothing signaling negligence to the judge and jury.

And that's how explosive settlements happen.

What side do you want to be on?



Corporate Transparency Act - Deadlines Reinstated

The nationwide injunction prohibiting enforcement of the Corporate Transparency Act (CTA) has been stayed; meaning, FinCEN will resume enforcement of the required beneficial ownership information (BOI) filings.

Simply put, the CTA filing requirements are reinstated.

FinCEN has issued a notice that reset the filing deadline for most companies to March 21, 2025.

See notice here: FinCEN Notice, FIN-2025-CTA1, 2/18/2025.

As a reminder, the Corporate Transparency Act requires most small businesses in the United States to make a filing with FinCEN (see here: https://boiefiling.fincen.gov/).

Each required entity must file a report containing the following information about the company:

- Entity's full legal name
- Trade names
- A complete current address
- The jurisdiction it was formed in or jurisdiction in which a foreign company first registers
- Internal Revenue Service Taxpayer Identification Number and Employer Identification Number
- Information about each beneficial owner of the company, including this about each person:
 - Full legal name
 - Date of birth
 - Current business or residential address
 - A unique identifying number from an acceptable identification document (i.e., passport, driver's license, etc.)

So that's the bad news – the CTA is back in effect.

What's the silver lining? Several opportunities for success remain. First, bipartisan <u>legislation</u> recently passed the House that would delay filing until the end of the year. A <u>companion</u> bill has been introduced in the Senate by Banking Chair Tim Scott. This legislation is unlikely to move forward on its own, but it could catch a ride on a must-pass bill like the upcoming CR. This ruling could be the catalyst to get that done.

Second, the following statement from FinCEN also opens the door for further administrative relief:

Notably, in keeping with Treasury's commitment to reducing regulatory burden on businesses, during this 30-day period FinCEN will assess its options to further modify deadlines, while prioritizing reporting for those entities that pose the most significant national security risks. FinCEN also intends to initiate a process this year to revise the BOI reporting rule to reduce burden for lower-risk entities, including many U.S. small businesses.

What exactly they have in mind is unclear, but both the 30-day grace period and the recognition that the current CTA rules overreach is a massive step forward and a signal that the new Administration intends to take a more business-friendly approach to the CTA. Is a further filing deadline delay part under consideration?

Finally, yesterday's ruling is not the final say in the courts either. By our count, there are *eleven* challenges to the CTA pending in federal courts and the lead case -NSBA v. Treasury - is awaiting a decision by the Eleventh Circuit any day now. We have a good chance to win that decision but the case is all but guaranteed to end up before the Supreme Court this year either way.

So the courts might save us from this poorly-conceived law in the end, but in the meantime we need help from the Administration. Vice President Vance and Secretary McMahon have already <u>weighed in</u> against the CTA. The court ruling means it's time for our friends at Treasury to do the same in a meaningful way.

Minnesota Professional Towing Association 2025 Scholarship Application

The purpose of this scholarship program is to assist young men and women whom are seeking a higher education in order to develop advanced skills.

Three scholarships of \$500.00 each will be awarded annually to applicants who must be at least a senior in high school and/or 18-25 years of age and is a son, daughter, or member in good standing with the MPTA.

MPTA Scholarship Guidelines

- Applicant must have a 2.5 GPA to qualify.
- Applicant must provide proof of performance with application (official school transcript).
- Applicant must provide proof of enrollment for institute of higher education with application.
- Applicant must provide two letters of recommendation from either a teacher, school advisor, or extra circular advisor (i.e. sports coach, club advisor).
- Applications must be returned to MPTA by May 20th of each year.
- Students may apply for scholarship a maximum of three times.
- Applicants do not need to study in the automotive industry.

Selection Process:

- The MPTA Board of Directors will select scholarship winners based on the criteria below from the applications:
 - Accomplishments specified on application (i.e. DECA, FBLA, sports, leadership roles, etc.)
 - Student's goals, both long-term and short-term
 - Student's GPA
 - Student's work ethic (Does the students hold a part-time job as well as attend school?)
- The applications will be reviewed by the Board of Directors at the May Board meeting.
- Scholarship winners will be contacted in late May.
- The Association will give the checks to the students in the spring of each year.

- ♦ The name February comes from the Latin word februum, which means "purification".
- Amethyst is the birthstone for February. The Ancient Greek word Amethystos translates to "not drunk".
